What is a Community School?

Sustainable Community Schools are created by a partnership between parents, teachers, school officials and community members. They are academically rigorous public schools that have:

- A positive climate and culture
- Robust, culturally-relevant curricula including the arts, physical education, career and technical education
- Inclusive before school and after-school programming
- College and career readiness programs
- · Quality teaching and recruitment methods
- Authentic parent / family engagement

Every child comes to school with different assets and barriers, but all children should have the same opportunity to learn and succeed. That's why Community Schools partner with other organizations to address:

- · Inadequate medical, dental, and vision care
- Food insecurity
- Environmental pollutants
- · Family relations and family stress
- Neighborhood issues like housing, safety, etc.
